Courses Taught, Furman University:

Constitutional Law—Judicial Process

The course will focuses on United States Supreme Court interpretation and treatment of federal and state rights and constraints related to the "separation of powers" doctrine. This class does not engage in a sterile analysis of a case and the legal reasoning and holding of the court. Rather, discussion and assignments focus on facts and political climates creating the controversy, how the case evolves into a Supreme Court level case and how the court approaches the case.

Constitutional Law—Civil Liberties

The course focuses on the role the United States Supreme Court plays in deciding issues related to the civil liberties of Americans. This class does not engage in a sterile analysis of a case and the legal reasoning and holding of the court. Rather, discussion and assignments will on the facts and political climates creating the controversy, how the case evolves into a Supreme Court level case and how the Court treated the case.

Law and Public Policy

This course centers on an important question: Do court rulings effect significant change in public policy? The course examines this question by examining U.S. Supreme Court, other federal courts and state court policy statements (or the absence of policy statements) in the following subject areas: death penalty, abortion, land loss, access to justice, discrimination (race, gender, sexual orientation) and affirmative action.

Local Internship

PS 85 increases student understanding of state and local government and politics, implementation of public policy, and intergovernmental relations. The centerpiece for learning in this course is the 165-hour internship with an organization that focuses on state or local public affairs. At the end of the term, each student should have a comprehensive and sophisticated view of state and local public affairs. Students also should be knowledgeable of and facile in the application of qualitative methods used in the social sciences
